How many lessons do you have and how long are they? What are the start and end times of the day?

We have four lessons in a day.

Period 1 is tutorial time and there is a specific curriculum for each year group.

We then have a further three lessons which would normally be 100 minutes long.

At present this is slightly different to allow for staggered breaks and lunches.

Shoeburyness High School is a community and we all work together to support each other. As well as our form tutors and teachers who are there to help students with their wellbeing and learning, each year group has their own Pastoral Year Manager and Academic Year Leader. We also have prefects and a Student Leadership Team who are there to help and support.

Do we have the same teacher for every lesson?

You will have specialist teachers for every subject you study. This means you will have different teachers but you will soon become familiar with them as your fortnightly timetable is the same.

How many pupils are in a class? Can you do cookery?

On average there are 28.

This will change sometimes depending on the subject you are studying. In Design and Technology for example, it will be smaller and this is where you will do food technology and cooking, as well as other practical activities.

How are you supposed to find your classes? What happens if you get lost?

At present, each year group is being taught in bubbles so classrooms are more restricted.

However in normal circumstances, we have various ways to help you find your way around the school.

For lunch you will remain in school unless we have been notified by your parents or carers that you have permission to go home.

You can either go to the canteen and buy food or bring in your own packed lunches. You can eat these in the canteen but also take them outside where there are benches to sit at.

Some food from the canteen can also be taken outside.

How many Year 7 will there be in the whole year?

310.
